



FACTSHEET FOR WOMEN LIVING IN VICTORIA WITH A GYNAECOLOGICAL CANCER

This fact sheet has been developed from feedback given by women who have been diagnosed with a gynaecological cancer. It outlines commonly used resources and services, but should not be seen as an exhaustive list. Inclusion does not necessarily mean endorsement.

"All women with a suspected or diagnosed gynaecological cancer should have access to a comprehensive multi-disciplinary team led by a gynaecological oncologist to provide high quality management tailored to her needs to achieve the best outcome for each woman" - National Gynaecological Cancer Service Delivery and Resource Framework — Cancer Australia and The Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists, 2011.

SUPPORT AND INFORMATION

Organisations or websites with a focus on supportive care for gynaecological cancers:

<u>BreaCan</u> is an information and support service for people affected by a gynaecological cancer or breast cancer, their families and friends. It is a statewide service available to people throughout Victoria and is staffed by peer support volunteers, all of whom have had a cancer experience. Phone 1300 781 500.

<u>Ovarian Cancer Australia</u> aims to ensure everyone affected by ovarian cancer feels personally supported and has access to and information about treatment and research. It offers a range of support services and resources including *Resilience*. Phone 1300 660 334.

<u>Cancer Australia</u> – (formerly the National Breast and Ovarian Cancer Centre) works to reduce the impact of cancer and improve the well being of those diagnosed by ensuring that evidence informs cancer prevention, screening, diagnosis, treatment and supportive care.

Palliative care:

Palliative care is specialised care and support provided for someone living with a life threatening ilness. Importantly, palliative care also involves care and support for family and caregivers. The goal of palliative care is to improve quality of life for patients, their families and caregivers by providing care that meets needs such as physical (including treatment of pain and other symptoms), emotional, social, cultural and spiritual.

ENTITLEMENTS AND FINANCES

Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme

What Medicare Covers

<u>Chronic Disease Management – Medicare</u> Access to Medicare rebates for some allied health services

<u>Mental Health – better access to psychologists – Medicare</u> Access to Medicare rebate for counselling via a psychologist

Centrelink information on entitlements and Carers Allowance

<u>Victorian Patient Transport Assistance Scheme (VPTAS)</u> Subsidises the travel and accommodation costs incurred by rural Victorians, and if appropriate, their escorts, who have no option but to travel a long distance to received approved medical specialist services.

Early release of Superannuation

<u>Cancer Council Victoria Financial Planning Referral Service</u> AMP financial planners can assist with cancer-related financial issues such as early access to superannuation or insurance benefits, dealing with mortgage hardship and advising on Centrelink, debt management and budgeting. This service is free for people who qualify via a means test. If you don't qualify for free help, paid assistance is available. Call Cancer Council Helpline on 13 11 20 to be referred.

<u>Cancer, work and you</u> A booklet for employees and self-employed people with cancer, and working carers. It contains information about how cancer can affect your ability to work, tips about working during treatment and recovery, and information about your rights and entitlements. There are also suggestions for people trying to balance employment and caring duties

<u>iheard</u> is a new myth-busting website launched by Cancer Council where the public can post questions about cancer with links to videos or articles and experts will give evidence-based answers.

<u>Forgotten Cancers Project</u> A project focusing on the causes of the less common cancers, including uterine cancer.

<u>Respecting Patient Choices</u> Advance care planning aims to keep you involved in your medical decisions, both now and in the future, whether you are healthy or have an illness.

<u>canSpeak</u> – canSpeak aims to provide a unified, independent voice for all people affected by cancer. It provides a forum for people touched by cancer to share issues, ideas and experiences that are

common across all cancer types. canSpeak is a national consumer advocacy group that also has links with consumer advocacy groups at state level.

Cancer Council Victoria offers people undergoing cancer treatment opportunity to be fitted with a free wig, regardless of where they're receiving treatment across Victoria. Located at the Cancer Council Victoria offices in Carlton (corner of Rathdowne and Victoria St) women are encouraged to call 13 11 20 to make an appointment between 9am and 4pm with one of the cancer nurses who can find and fit a wig that may give patients a greater sense of self-confidence during and after cancer treatment.
